CORRECTION:

I made an error in last month's OPS report regarding currency hours for new crew and coxswains who certified late in the year. Reading Chapter 5 (Currency Maintenance) in the Auxiliary Boat Crew Training Manual, the following is stated: "The currency cycle begins on 01 January of the year following initial certification. Currency requirements must be met by 31 December of each year. For example, if a member is certified 15 July 2005, that member's first currency year begins on 01 January 2006, and the member must meet all annual currency requirements by the end of 2006 (31 December 2006). The third-year currency requirements must be met by 31 December 2008."

GOOD SURFACE INFORMATION:

OUT-OF-DATE-FLARES: (Contributed by Neil Nevesny)

The below information is a "Keeper" for all of us. I know I have a few (way too many) out-ofdate flares that need to find a good home.

Used Flare Disposal Report

Working on finding disposal sites in the Bay Area has been one of the most amusing and frustrating assignments I have been given. I won't bore you with all the steps I have gone through to get the following information, but it has been a merry-go-round between state, county, police, fire department, bomb squads, environmental departments, and county administrators.

Some new policies have been written in response to my inquiry and some old ones have been dusted off and put back into use. After all this has been said and done, I still cannot guarantee disposal of flares will be allowed at any of the sites enumerated in the attachment to this report.

The only things that I can say with certainty are as follows:

- 1. California has a law that the only people who can pick up and transport or store flares are those licensed for that purpose. If any unlicensed person accepts flares for disposal they are breaking the law. However, any individual can hold, transport or store their own flares.
- 2. Flares are considered explosives. However, you may see information on County websites stating that explosives are not accepted. This statement is now obsolete with regard to flare disposal.
- 3. All counties must provide a disposal site for flares.
- 4. Hazardous waste sites do not have to accept flares. They may have other alternative sites for disposing of them.
- 5. Personnel at hazardous waste sites do not always have instructions regarding county policy for accepting flares at their site. (Are you getting the picture?!) The name of a person for employees to call will be included in each county description.
- 6. Individuals may only dispose of flares in their county of residence ~ not the location of their boat(s).

Hours: Thursday, Friday, Saturday 8:00 am to 4:00 pm. Closed Jan 1, July 4, Thanksgiving and following Friday, Dec. 25/26

Limitations: 12 flares per person per year. Appointment necessary.

Contra Costa has no central county policy for flare disposal. Authority for flare disposal is vested in each Fire Chief for the county's 23 Fire Districts. Each Chief sets that district's policy concerning flare disposal. Residents of Contra Costa County, depending on their city of residence, must call their local Fire District to inquire about flare disposal. These policies may change whenever Chiefs change.

REMINDER: New Crew & New Coxswains

Initial Crew needs to be BQ or AUXOP, have taken a TCT class within the past five years and have taken ICS 100 and 700.

Initial Coxswain needs all the above, at least twenty eight hours underway as crew, in addition to having taken ICS 200 and 800A plus the Operations Policy Test, available on line, and NavRules closed book exam (Series 70).

ICS Classes: ICS 100, 200, 700 & 800A are available on line. ICS-210, Initial Incident Commander, is a classroom course designed for single resource leaders and type 5/type 4 incident commanders. This 4 hour classroom course will be required for Auxiliary coxswains, pilots, any member qualifying in the trident program or any other team/task force leader. Given the limited access to this course, no date for completion has been determined. Single resource leaders are highly encouraged to take ICS 210 if the opportunity is available. ICS210 is only available via classroom. This four hour class is normally offered twice a year at the PCA Fair on Saturday morning and a second class Saturday afternoon.

QUALIFICATIONS AND RE-CERTS:

Next are those Divisions and Flotillas that have committed to an Operational Event for 2008. We know there will be more listed soon but please check with your IS officer and see when you are due for your, TCT, NAV RULES and 3-year Currency Maintenance ride with a Qualification Examiner. Please, please, whatever you do, do not wait until the end of the year. Schedule early. New Coxswains or new PWC Operators you also need to pass the on line OPERATIONS POLICY MANUAL EXAM prior your check ride.
